Philanthropy is entrepreneurial in nature. It is often supported by passion, flexibility, and resourcefulness, while demanding creativity and the willingness to take risks. All these qualities often exist on both sides of the philanthropic equation—in the donors, or funders, and the recipients—and when they do, measurable change is within reach.

The Foundation for Advancing Family Medicine (FAFM) came across this exact paradigm as it selected the recipients of the Workplace Integrated Demonstration Projects (WID) Grant with funding support from Employment and Social Development Canada program. The WID Grant is one prong of the broader Team Primary Care - Training for Transformation initiative. This groundbreaking program brings together more than 65 partners, under the co-leadership of the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC) and the Canadian Health Workforce Network, to enhance the capacity of interprofessional comprehensive primary care practitioners through improved training, team supports, and planning tools.

Through a peer-review process under the leadership of Dr. C. Ruth Wilson, Companion of the Order of Canada, and Dr. Marie-Dominique Beaulieu, Member of the Order of Canada, more than 40 people reviewed the submitted proposals, selecting 25 projects that centre on the adoption or optimization of interprofessional primary care teams. The goal of each of these projects is to collectively strengthen accessibility, cultural responsiveness, and the comprehensiveness of primary care through creative and sustainable approaches that exemplify the entrepreneurial qualities of our family physicians and primary care providers in the face of patient needs. For the communities where these projects take place, it means measurable change is on the way.

CFPC members,

In February I wrote as the FAFM CEO to invite CFPC members to consider applying for the Workplace Integrated Demonstration (WID) Projects Grant. This program represents the most recent investment that FAFM has made to support the advancement of family medicine with a specific focus on facilitating the adoption of interprofessional team-based practices in family medicine. More than 220 projects competed for funding, which was shared between recipients of an invitational, trainingfocused call and an open call, which centred on the support of team-based care practices.

The selection phase of this FAFM initiative is now complete and funding support has been awarded to 25 outstanding projects. The funded projects will be completed in March 2024. You can find the list of recipients on our website at fafm.cfpc.ca/wid/recipients.
