# Nomination Guidelines

## Lifetime Achievement Award in Family Medicine Research

Lifetime Achievement Award in Family Medicine Research honours an individual who is a trailblazer and leader in family medicine research and who has made substantial contributions to family medicine research during their active career years.

This award gives public recognition to their work and to the discipline of family medicine.

Lifetime Achievement Award nominees must be **nominated by two or more peers**.

Nominators are asked to consider and describe the nominees' accomplishments in the following domains:

- 1) **Defined areas of research expertise within family medicine.** Briefly describe how the nominee has built on and advanced specific areas of family medicine/primary care research? What novel or innovative approach is uniquely associated with the nominated individual?
- 2) **Research grants.** Briefly describe whether the nominee has served as principal, co-principal, and/or co-investigator on multiple funded research projects. What are the most significant funded studies the nominee led? Nominators may describe funding sources, number of grants, total funding amounts, etc.
- 3) **Scholarly output.** Briefly outline the career-long scholarly outputs of the nominee. This includes but is not necessarily limited to books, book chapters, clinical practice guidelines, peer-reviewed journal articles, conference presentations, keynote addresses, and non-peer reviewed/media press. Nominators may wish to provide metrics for the nominee, such as the number of first authored publications, number of citations, etc.
- 4) **Professional research roles.** Briefly describe the nominee's contributions and activities in each of the following areas:
  - a. Research appointments, including, but is not limited to appointments such as research director within a university/hospital/institute; scientific editor of a peer-reviewed journal; or appointed service on research boards or committees of organizations.

- b. Mentorship roles, including supervision of undergraduate medical students, family medicine residents, master's or PhD students (with an approximate number), and service as an adviser and mentor to early- and mid-career researchers and/or patient- or community-engaged research initiatives.
- c. Scientific review activities, including participation in scientific review processes, such as on review committees for research funding agencies and journals and review of abstracts for scientific conferences and events.
- d. Past awards of recognition, including awards received for research accomplishment and excellence, excluding research grants.
